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The Office of Administrative Rules (OAR) is responsible for the following:

- Publishing the Oklahoma Administrative Code
- Publishing the Oklahoma Register
- Maintaining official records of the state's rules and rulemaking notices
- Publishing public body meeting notices



OAR Publications

Format review and publish for 176 regulatory agencies

24 issues of the Oklahoma Register per year

- 3,000 pages of rulemaking documents
- Published on the 1st and 15th of each month

Annual publication of the Oklahoma Administrative Code

- 17,000 pages 35,000 active sections
- Latest effective version codified each year

OAR Publications

Record and publish meeting notices for public bodies

Open Meeting Notices

- 2,199 active public bodies
 - Agencies, boards, and commissions
 - City and county entities
 - Schools
- 9,987 notices posted per year
- Meeting notices include agency rulemaking hearings



Transparency, efficiency, and accountability

- In January 2019, Governor Stitt was sworn into office with a call for a Top 10 goal for state agencies.
 - State agencies to become more accountable to citizens
 - Create a government that is results oriented, transparent, and efficient
 - Be Top 10 in our responsibilities.
- OAR conducted an internal review and determined our current filing and publishing system to be outdated and unable to meet these goals.
 - Architecture dating from 1992
 - Components of system were approaching end-of-life and represented difficult to maintain technologies
 - Antiquated applications presented the following issues:
 - · Heavy reliance on paper and printing, requiring substantial printing budget
 - Inefficient work processes, requiring same tasks be completed multiple times
 - Multiple conversion phases led to numerous errors, requiring extensive cleanup throughout the process
 - Inability to publish transparent, user-friendly website for citizens which restricted citizen participation in the rulemaking process
- This system was inefficient, non-transparent, and restricted citizen access to the rulemaking process.

Top 10 Vision

Modernize the filing and publishing of administrative rules, increase efficiency, and expand citizen participation and access to agency, board, and commission rulemaking

Old

- Little to no citizen participation in rulemaking. Process outdated and non-transparent.
- Agencies drafted rules using internal versions. Submitted via email, paper, or CD.
- No centralized location to connect agencies, citizens, Governor, and Legislature during the rulemaking process.
- Official Oklahoma Administrative Code and Oklahoma Register published in paper format and mailed to subscribers.

New

- Citizen centric focus that maximizes transparency, accessibility, accountability, and efficiency.
- Innovative, web-based drafting system, eliminating paper or CD submissions.
- One-stop, rules portal at rules.ok.gov that citizens, agencies, and elected officials access for all steps of the rulemaking process.
- Amend Administrative Procedures Act, allowing official, electronic publication of the Oklahoma Administrative Code and Oklahoma Register




